



Getting Started

Getting to Know Your Phone





Key Functions

Key	Function
Power key	Press and hold to restart or power off.Press to turn off or on the screen display.
Volume key	Press or hold either end of the key to turn the volume up or down.
(Home key)	 Touch to return to the home screen from any application or screen. Touch and hold to use the Google Assistant.
(Recent apps key)	 Touch to see recently used applications. Touch twice to switch between the two most recent applications.
(Back key)	Touch to go to the previous screen.



You can exchange the position of the **Recent apps** key and the **Back** key. From the home screen, touch **Settings** > **Features** > **System navigation** to personalize the setting and see tutorial.

Setting Up Your Phone

The nano-SIM card can be installed or removed while the phone is turned on


The microSDHC card can be installed and removed while the phone is turned on. Unmount the microSDHC card before removing it.

Power off before installing or removing the battery.

WARNING!

To avoid damage to the phone, do not use any other kind of SIM cards, or any non-standard nano-SIM card cut from a SIM card. You can get a standard nano-SIM card from your service provider.

 Place your finger in the slot at the lower left of the back cover to lift and remove the cover.




2. Hold your nano-SIM card and microSDHC card with the metal contacts facing down and slide them into their respective slots.



NOTE:

Some applications may require a microSDHC card to work normally and/or may store data on the card. Therefore, it is recommended that you keep a microSDHC card installed and not remove or replace it randomly.

3. Insert the battery, making sure the gold contacts line up. Press down gently to secure.



4. Replace the cover over the back of the phone, and then press down along the edges to secure. Make sure there are no gaps.


Charging the Battery

Your phone's battery should have enough power for the phone to turn on, find a signal, and make a few calls. You should fully charge the battery as soon as possible.

WARNING!

Use only ZTE-approved chargers and USB cables. The use of unapproved accessories could damage your phone or cause the battery to explode.

1. Connect the cable to the charging jack. Ensure that the cable is inserted in the correct direction.



- Connect the charger to a standard AC power outlet. If the phone
 is on, you'll see a charging icon, such as or appear in
 the status bar.
- 3. Disconnect the charger when the battery is fully charged.

NOTE:

If the battery is extremely low, you may be unable to power on the phone even when it is being charged. In this case, try again after charging the phone for at least 20 minutes. Contact customer service if you still cannot power on the phone after prolonged charging.

Powering Your Phone On/Off

- Press and hold the **Power** key to turn on your phone.
- To turn it off, press and hold the Power key to open the options menu and touch ∪ > ∪.

Setting Up Your Phone for the First Time

When you first power on your phone after you purchase it or reset it to factory settings (see <u>Reset Options</u>), you will need to set it up before using it. Select the language and then follow the prompts to set up your phone.

Locking/Unlocking the Screen and Keys

Your phone allows you to quickly lock the screen and keys (put the phone to Sleep mode) when not in use and also to turn the screen back on and unlock it when you need it.

Lock the Screen and Keys

To quickly turn the screen off and lock the keys, press the **Power** key.

NOTE:

To save battery power, the phone automatically turns off the screen after a certain period of time when you leave it idle. You will still be able to receive messages and calls while the phone screen is off.

Unlock the Screen and Keys

- 1. Press the **Power** key to turn the screen on.
- 2. Swipe up on the screen.
 - or -

Swipe away from at the bottom right of the screen to open the Camera app.

- or -


Double-tap a notification to open the related app.

NOTE:

If you have set a pattern, a PIN, or a password as the screen lock, you'll need to unlock the screen by drawing the pattern or entering the PIN/password. See <u>Protecting Your Phone With Screen Locks</u>.

Getting to Know the Home Screen

The home screen is the starting point for your phone's applications, functions, and menus. You can customize your home screen by adding shortcuts and folders.



Extended Home Screen Panels

Your home screen is extendable, providing more space for shortcuts and more. Swipe left or right to switch between home screen panels.

To add a new home screen panel:

- Touch and hold a shortcut icon or folder on the home screen or swipe up on the home screen and touch and hold an app.
- 2. Drag the item to the right edge of the screen to create a new home screen panel and put the item on it.

Personalizing

Setting the Navigation Style

You can set the navigation style as virtual navigation or gesture navigation.

Use Virtual Navigation

To enable virtual navigation:

- 1. Open Settings and touch Features > System navigation.
- 2. Select Virtual navigation.

NOTE:

Touch beside **Virtual navigation** to change the navigation key layout, or turn on or off the concealable navigation bar. To hide the navigation bar, switch off **Always show navigation bar** and touch on the navigation bar. To display the navigation bar again, swipe up from the bottom of the screen.

To use virtual navigation:

- Touch (the Home key) to return to the home screen from any application or screen.
- Touch and hold to use the Google Assistant.
- Touch (the Back key) to go to the previous screen.
- Touch (the Recent apps key) to see recently used apps.
- Touch twice to switch to the most recent application.

Use Gesture Navigation

To enable gesture navigation:

- 1. Open Settings and touch Features > System navigation.
- 2. Select Gestures.

NOTE:

Touch beside **Gestures** to adjust the back sensitivity of edges for gesture navigation.

To use virtual navigation:

- Swipe up from the bottom of your screen to return to the home screen from any application or screen.
- Swipe up from the bottom of your screen to the middle and hold to see recently used apps.
- Swipe left or right along the bottom of your screen to switch among recently used apps.
- Swipe inside from the left or right edge of your screen to go to the previous screen.
- Swipe up from the bottom left or bottom right of your screen to activate the Google Assistant.

Changing the System Language

- Open Settings and touch System > Languages & input > Languages.
- 2. Touch Add a language and then the language you need.
- 3. Touch and hold the language you need and drag it to the top.

Setting the Date and Time

- 1. Open Settings and touch System > Date & time.
- 2. Set the date, time, time zone, and time format.
 - To adjust the date and time automatically, touch to turn on Use network-provided time.
 - To adjust the date and time manually, touch to turn off Use network-provided time and touch Date/Time to change the date and time.
 - To adjust the time zone automatically, touch to turn on Use network-provided time zone.
 - To adjust the time zone manually, touch to turn off Use network-provided time zone and touch Time zone to set the correct time zone.
 - To adjust the time format, touch to turn on/off Use locale default or Use 24-hour format.

Changing the Ringtone, Notification Sound, and Alarm Sound

You can customize the default ringtone for incoming calls, the default notification sound, and the default alarm sound.

- 1. Open Settings and touch Sound > Advanced > Ringtones.
- Touch Phone ringtone, Default notification sound, or Default alarm sound.
- 3. Scroll through the list and select the ringtone you'd like to use.

4. Touch OK.

NOTES:

- · Many applications have their own notification sound settings.
- See <u>Set a Ringtone for a Contact</u> for how to assign a special ringtone to an individual contact.
- When selecting ringtones or sounds, touch Add ringtone / Add notification / Add alarm to select an audio file in your phone or microSDHC card

Turning System Sounds On/Off

- 1. Open Settings and touch Sound > Advanced.
- In the OTHER SOUNDS AND VIBRATIONS section, touch the switches beside each option to turn it on or off.

Adjusting Volumes

- Open Settings and touch Sound.
- Drag the sliders below Media volume, Alarm volume, Ring and notification volume, Notification volume, and Call volume to adjust the volume for each type of audio.

Switching to Silent or Vibration Mode

You can set the phone to silent or vibration mode by using one of the following methods.

NOTE:

Silent and vibration modes will not silence your alarms.

Press the Volume key and touch or I to switch the phone to vibration or silent mode.

NOTE:

Press the **Volume** key and touch \(\) to restore sound.

 Open Settings and touch Sound > Advanced > Notification mode and select Vibrate or Mute to switch to vibration or silent mode.

NOTE:

Select Ring to restore sound.

 Swipe down from the top of the screen to open the notification panel and drag the panel downwards. Touch **Ring** or **Vibrate** to switch the phone to vibration or silent mode. See <u>Using Quick</u> <u>Settings</u>.

NOTE:

Touch Silent to restore sound.

 Press the Volume up key and the Power key at the same time to switch to silent mode or vibration mode.

NOTE:

You can select to switch to silent or vibration mode by opening Settings > Sound > Switch to vibrate/Switch to silent and choosing Mute or Vibrate.

Using Do Not Disturb Mode

You can limit interruptions with Do Not Disturb mode. This mode can mute sound, stop vibration, and block visual disturbances. You can pick what you block and what you allow.

Turn on or off Do Not Disturb Mode

- 1. Open Settings and touch Sound > Do Not Disturb.
- 2. Touch TURN ON NOW or TURN OFF NOW.

Set Exceptions for Do Not Disturb Mode

- 1. Open Settings and touch Sound > Do Not Disturb.
- 2. Select the following options and choose what to allow.
 - People: Allow calls, messages, or conversations with the people you choose.
 - ▶ **Apps:** Choose which apps can send you notifications.
 - Alarms & other interruptions: Allow alarms, media sounds, touch sounds, reminders, or calendar events.

Set an Automatic Schedule

You can set automatic schedules to activate Do Not Disturb mode for specific times or events.

- Open Settings and touch Sound > Do Not Disturb > Schedules.
- 2. Touch an existing schedule to turn it on or off, or touch to the schedule to customize it

- or -

Touch **Add more** to create your own schedules.

Set How Long Do Not Disturb Mode Lasts

- Open Settings and touch Sound > Do Not Disturb > Advanced > Duration for Quick Settings.
- Set how long Do Not Disturb mode will stay on when you turn it on.

Choose Settings for Hidden Notifications

- Open Settings and touch Sound > Do Not Disturb > Advanced > Display options for hidden notifications.
- Set notification behavior in Do Not Disturb mode. You can block sound or visuals from notifications, or customize more restrictions

Applying New Wallpapers

You can set the wallpaper for the home screen and lock screen.

- 1. Touch and hold an empty place on the home screen.
- 2. Touch Wallpapers.
- Select a preset wallpaper, or touch GALLERY > Gallery Go to select a picture and pan and zoom on it to select the area for the wallpaper.
- 4. Touch SET AS.
- Choose where the wallpaper should be used by touching Set Home screen, Set lock screen, or Set both.

NOTE:

You can also set the wallpaper by opening the **Settings** app and selecting **Display > Wallpaper**.

Using Dark Theme

When Dark theme is enabled, your phone will turn the screen to dark with white text on a black background, relieving eye irritation caused by screen glare at night.

- 1. Open Settings and touch Display > Dark theme.
- 2. Touch TURN ON NOW to enable Dark theme.
 - or -

If you want to set a schedule when Dark theme will be turned on automatically, touch **Schedule** and set the start and end time.

NOTE:

Not all apps support Dark theme.

Using Night Light

You can enable Night Light to tint the screen amber and reduce the intensity of bright colors for eye protection, or set a schedule when Night Light will be turned on.

- Open Settings and touch Display > Night Light.
- 2. Touch TURN ON NOW to enable Night Light.
 - or -

If you want to set a schedule when Night Light will be turned on

- automatically, touch **Schedule** and set the start and end time.
- Drag the slider below **Intensity** to adjust the eye protection effect when Night Light is on.

Protecting Your Phone With Screen Locks

You can protect your phone by creating a screen lock. When it is enabled, you can swipe up on the lock screen, and then draw a pattern or enter a numeric PIN or password to unlock the phone's screen and keys.

- 1. Open Settings and touch Security > Screen lock.
- 2. Touch None, Swipe, Pattern, PIN, or Password.
 - ▶ Touch **None** to disable screen lock protection.
 - Touch Swipe to enable screen lock and allow unlocking with a "swipe" gesture. You can unlock the screen by touching the display and sliding up.
 - Touch Pattern to create a pattern that you must draw to unlock the screen.
 - ► Touch **PIN** or **Password** to set a numeric PIN or a password that you must enter to unlock the screen.
- For Pattern, PIN, or Password, select how you want notifications and their contents to show when the phone is locked, and then touch **Done**.

NOTE:

Remember the pattern, PIN, or password you set. Otherwise, you will have to contact the customer service to reflash the phone software to use the phone, and all data on your phone will be erased.

Protecting Your Phone With App Pinning

You can pin an app's screen to keep it in view until you unpin it. This feature can be used, for example, to let a trusted friend play a specific game.

NOTE:

When an app is pinned, the pinned app may open other apps and your personal data may be accessible.

Turn On App Pinning

- Open Settings and touch Security > App pinning.
- 2. Touch the On/Off switch.
- 3. Read the on-screen prompts and touch OK.
- 4. To add security for unpinning, switch on Lock device when unpinning and set up a screen lock, or switch on Ask for unlock pattern before unpinning, Ask for PIN before unpinning, or Ask for password before unpinning if you've set a screen lock already.

Pin an App

- 1. Ensure that app pinning is turned on.
- Open the recent apps list. If the app you want to keep in view is not in recent apps, open it first.
- Swipe left and right to find the app card. Then touch at the top of the card and select Pin.

Unpin the App

- To unpin the app and return to normal use, touch and hold both the **Back** key and the **Recent apps** key for virtual navigation; swipe up from the bottom of the screen and hold for a while for gesture navigation.
- If screen lock is enabled for app pinning, swipe up on the lock screen and draw the pattern or enter the PIN/password.

Knowing the Basics

Monitoring the Phone Status

The status bar at the top of the home screen provides phone and service status icons on the right side. Below are some of the icons you may see.

Managing Notifications

The status bar at the top of the home screen provides notification icons on the left. Below are some of the icons you may see.

Indicator	What it means
E	New message
~	Missed call
9	Call in progress

Open/Close the Notification Panel

Notifications report the arrival of new messages, calendar events, and alarms, as well as ongoing events. You can open the notification panel to view the details of notifications.

- To open the notification panel, swipe your finger down on the home screen or from the top of the screen.
- To close the notification panel, swipe your finger up from the bottom of the screen.

Respond to or Remove a Notification

In the notification panel, you can respond to a notification or remove the notifications. The notification panel also supports expandable notifications that let you perform additional actions right from the notification itself.

- To respond to a notification, touch it.

- · To remove a notification, swipe it left or right.
- To remove all non-persistent notifications, touch Clear all below all the notifications.
- To manage notifications you have received, touch and hold a notification and then choose to silence or turn off this type of notification. You can also touch to customize more notification settings for the app.

NOTE:

If you turn off notifications for an app, you may miss its important alerts and updates. Some notifications (such as those from the system) cannot be turned off.

Using Quick Settings

The Quick Settings make it convenient to view or change the most common settings for your phone.

Swipe down with two fingers from the top of the screen, or open the notification panel and drag the panel downward to view the Quick Settings. You can swipe left or right to find all Quick Settings tiles.

To turn on or off settings quickly:

From the Quick Settings panel, touch a tile to turn its feature on or off.

Touch and hold certain tiles to access more settings options. For example, touch and hold the Wi-Fi tile to open Wi-Fi settings.

To customize the quick settings panel:

You can add, remove or rearrange the tiles on the Quick Settings panel.

Touch / below the panel and do one of the following:

- Touch and hold a tile and drag it to the position you want.
- Touch and hold a tile and drag it below "DRAG HERE TO REMOVE" to hide it.
- In the HOLD AND DRAG TO ADD TILES section, drag a tile up to show it in the Quick Settings panel.

Organizing With Folders

You can create folders on the home screen and add several shortcuts to a folder.

- 1. On the home screen, touch and hold a shortcut.
- Drag the shortcut over another and release your finger. A new folder will be created and both shortcuts are added into the folder.
- To add more shortcuts into the folder, touch and hold each shortcut and drag it over the folder before releasing it.

NOTES:

- To remove a shortcut from a folder, touch the folder to open it.
 Touch and hold the shortcut and drag it to the home screen.
- Touch the folder and then touch the name field to rename the folder.

Managing Shortcuts and Folders

Add Shortcuts

- 1. To add a shortcut, swipe up on the home screen.
- 2. Slide to browse the available applications.
- Touch and hold an application icon and drag it to a home screen panel.

NOTE:

While holding the shortcut, you can drag it to the right edge of the screen to create a new home screen panel and put the item on it.

Move Shortcuts or Folders

- 1. Touch and hold a shortcut or folder on the home screen.
- 2. Drag it to the place you need.

Remove Shortcuts or Folders

- 1. Touch and hold a shortcut or folder on the home screen.
- 2. Drag it to **Remove** at the top.

Rearranging the Primary Shortcuts

The home screen includes a customizable primary shortcuts area near the bottom above the navigation bar. You can keep up to five items in the primary shortcuts area visible from all home screens. Drag shortcuts or folders in or out of the area to rearrange them.

Editing Text

- Move the insertion point: Touch where you want to type. The cursor blinks in the new position, and a tab appears below it.
 Drag the tab to move the cursor.
- Select text: Touch and hold or double-tap within the text. The nearest word highlights, with a tab at each end of the selection.
 Drag the tabs to change the selection.
- Cut or copy: Select the text you want to manipulate. Then touch
 Cut or Copy to cut or copy the text to the clipboard.
- Replace text with the clipboard text: Select the text you want to replace. Then touch Paste.
- Insert clipboard text in the text field: Touch the tab below the cursor. Then touch Paste.

Opening and Switching Apps

Open an App

- 1. Swipe up on the home screen.
- 2. Swipe up or down on the screen and touch an app to open it.

Switch Between Recently Opened Apps

 Touch the Recent apps key or, if Gestures is used for system navigation, swipe up from the bottom of the screen to the middle and hold. The apps you've used recently are displayed as a series of cards. Slide left and right to see all the cards. 2. Touch a card to open that app.

NOTE:

You can swipe a card up to remove it from the screen, which will free up running memory on the phone.

Uninstalling an Application

- 1. Swipe up on the home screen.
- Touch and hold an application icon and drag it to Uninstall at the top of the screen.
- 3. Touch **OK** to uninstall the app.
- NOTE:

Some preinstalled apps cannot be uninstalled.

Connecting to Networks and Devices

Connecting to Mobile Networks

Control Mobile Data Use

- Open Settings and touch Network & Internet > Mobile network
- 2. Touch the **Mobile data** switch to enable or disable mobile data use.

Check Access Point Names

To connect to the Internet you can use the default Access Point Names (APN). Open Settings and touch Network & Internet > Mobile network > Advanced > Access point names to check the default APN



To set the APN to default settings, touch : > Reset to default.

Select Network Operator

- Open Settings and touch Network & Internet > Mobile network > Advanced
- 2. Touch to turn off Automatically select network.
- 3. Wait for the phone to search for available networks and touch a network in the network list to register manually.

Connecting to Wi-Fi

Wi-Fi is a wireless networking technology that can provide Internet access at distances of up to 300 feet (100 meters), depending on the Wi-Fi router and your surroundings.

Turn Wi-Fi On and Connect to a Wi-Fi Network

- 1. Open Settings and touch Network & Internet > Wi-Fi.
- 2. Slide the **Use Wi-Fi** switch to the on position to turn on Wi-Fi.
- 3. Touch a network name to connect to it.
- If the network is secured, enter the password and touch CONNECT.
- NOTE:

Your phone automatically connects to previously used Wi-Fi networks when they are in range.

Get Notified of Open Networks

- 1. Open Settings and touch Network & Internet > Wi-Fi.
- Touch Wi-Fi preferences.
- 3. Slide the Notify for public networks switch to the on position.

When Wi-Fi is on, you receive notifications in the status bar when your phone detects a high-quality public Wi-Fi network. Switch off this option to turn off notifications.

Add a Wi-Fi Network

You can add a Wi-Fi network if the network does not broadcast its name (SSID) or to add a Wi-Fi network when you are out of range.

To connect to a secured network, you first need to get the security details from the network's administrator.

- Open Settings and touch Network & Internet > Wi-Fi.
- 2. Slide the Use Wi-Fi switch to the on position.
- At the bottom of the available Wi-Fi networks, touch Add network.
- Enter the network SSID (name). If necessary, enter security or other network configuration details.
- 5. Touch SAVE.

Forget a Wi-Fi Network

You can make your phone forget about the details of a Wi-Fi network that you added—for example, if you don't want the phone to connect to it automatically or if it is a network that you no longer use.

- Open Settings and touch Network & Internet > Wi-Fi > Saved networks.
- 2. Touch the Wi-Fi network name and then touch FORGET.

Connecting to Bluetooth Devices

Bluetooth is a short-range wireless communication technology. Phones or other devices with Bluetooth capabilities can exchange information wirelessly within a few feet. The Bluetooth devices must be paired before the communication is performed.

Change the Device Name

- Open Settings and touch Connected devices > Connection preferences > Bluetooth.
- 2. Slide the **Bluetooth** switch to the **On** position if *Bluetooth* is off.
- Touch Device name.
- 4. Edit the name and touch OK.

Pair With Another Bluetooth Device

- Open Settings and touch Connected devices > Pair new device
 - Your phone automatically turns *Bluetooth* on and scans for and displays the IDs of all available *Bluetooth* devices in range.
- 2. Touch the device you want to pair with.
- If necessary, confirm that the Bluetooth passkeys are the same between the two devices and touch PAIR. Alternatively, enter a Bluetooth passkey and touch PAIR.
 - Pairing is successfully completed when the other device accepts the connection or the same passkey is entered.

NOTE:

The *Bluetooth* passkey may be fixed for certain devices, such as headsets and hands-free car kits. You can try entering 0000 or 1234 (the most common passkeys) or refer to the documents for that device.

Forget a Bluetooth Device

You can make your phone forget its pairing connection with another *Bluetooth* device. To connect to the device again, you need to search for it and enter or confirm a passkey again.

- 1. Open Settings and touch Connected devices.
- Ensure that Bluetooth is turned on and, in the list of PREVIOUSLY
 CONNECTED DEVICES, touch beside the one you want to
 forget.
- 3. Touch FORGET > FORGET DEVICE.

Send Data via Bluetooth

- Open the appropriate application and select the file or item you want to share.
- Select the option for sharing via Bluetooth. The method may vary by application and data type.
- Touch a Bluetooth device the phone has paired with or wait for it to search for new devices and touch one of them.

Receive Data via Bluetooth

- 1. Turn Bluetooth on before trying to receive data via Bluetooth.
- Touch ACCEPT to start receiving the data. If necessary, swipe down on the status bar, and touch ACCEPT on the Bluetooth sharing notification.

Depending on your storage setting and whether a microSDHC card is installed, received files are stored automatically in a dedicated folder (bluetooth, for instance). You can access them with the Files app.

Connecting to Your Computer via USB

You can connect your phone to a computer with a USB cable to transfer files in both directions, charge the phone, or install the driver.

Connect Your Phone to a Computer via USB

- 1. Connect your phone to the PC with a USB cable.
- The Use USB for options menu will automatically open, and you can choose one of the following options.
 - File transfer: Transfer files between the phone and the computer.
 - PTP: Transfer photos or files if MTP (File transfer) mode is not supported by the computer.
 - ▶ Charge this device: Charge your phone via USB.
 - Install driver: Install the driver needed for some USB connection modes (such as File transfer). You only need to install the driver on the same PC once.

NOTE:

You can also install the driver on PC by running the executable file in the new CD-ROM drive.

Disconnect Your Phone From the Computer

To disconnect the phone from the computer, simply unplug the USB cable when you're finished.

Using the microSDHC Card as Portable or Device Storage

You can use your microSDHC card as portable storage when there's already content such as your media and other files so that you don't lose them.

If your microSDHC card is new or doesn't have content you want to keep, you can also set it up as an extension of the device storage, and this requires formatting that prevents the microSDHC card from working with other devices.

CAUTION:

As part of the device storage, the microSDHC card may have data on it that is necessary for some apps to function normally. Therefore, do not remove or replace the card randomly.

Set Up the microSDHC Card as Portable Storage

When you install a microSDHC card that has not been used on your phone before, the phone will mount the card as portable storage by default.

To remove the microSDHC card from your phone:

If you need to remove the microSDHC card used as portable storage while the phone is on, you must unmount it first.

- 1. Open Settings and touch Storage.
- Touch next to the microSDHC card name in the PORTABLE STORAGE section.
- When the screen prompts the card is safely ejected, you can remove it from the phone.

To erase and format the microSDHC card:

- 1. Open Settings and touch Storage.
- Touch the microSDHC card name in the PORTABLE STORAGE section.
- 3. Touch Format > FORMAT SD CARD.
- 4. Touch **Done** when formatting is finished.

CAUTION:

The formatting procedure erases all the data on the microSDHC card, after which the files CANNOT be retrieved.

Set Up the microSDHC Card as Device Storage

If your microSDHC card is new or doesn't have content you want to keep, you can format the card and use it as part of the device storage. If you move the microSDHC card to another device, it'll be formatted before it can be used.

- 1. Open Settings and touch Storage.
- Touch the microSDHC card name in the PORTABLE STORAGE section.
- Touch Format as internal > FORMAT SD CARD.

CAUTION:

The formatting procedure erases all the data on the microSDHC card, after which the files CANNOT be retrieved.

- The phone will prompt you to move your photos, files and other data from the phone to the microSDHC card. Select Move content or Move content later. Follow the onscreen instructions to continue.
- Touch Done.

To move data between the phone and the microSDHC card:

With the microSDHC card as part of the device storage, you can move your photos, files and other data between the phone and the card any time.

- 1. Open Settings and touch Storage.
- 2. To move data from the phone to the microSDHC card, touch the microSDHC card name; to move data from the card to the phone, touch **Internal shared storage**.

- 3. Touch > Migrate data.
- 4. Touch Move content.
- 5. If prompted, touch Done.



Whenever you move data between the phone and the microSDHC card, the destination is used to save new apps and personal data (such as photos and videos) and only the destination is accessible from a computer.

To remove the microSDHC card from your phone:

If you need to remove the microSDHC card used as device storage while the phone is on, you must unmount it first.

- 1. Open Settings and touch Storage.
- 2. Touch your microSDHC card name below DEVICE STORAGE.
- 3. Touch > **Eject**.
 - NOTE:

Before ejecting the card, ensure that you have moved data and apps to the phone.

- 4. Touch EJECT.
- When the screen prompts the card is safely ejected, you can remove it from the phone.

To reformat the microSDHC card as portable storage:

If you no longer want to use your microSDHC card as device storage, you can reformat the card as portable storage.

NOTE:

Before the formatting, ensure that you have moved data and apps to the phone.

- 1. Open Settings and touch Storage.
- 2. Touch your microSDHC card name below DEVICE STORAGE.
- 3. Touch > Format as portable.
- 4. Touch FORMAT.
- 5. Touch Done.

CAUTION:

The formatting procedure erases all the data on the microSDHC card, after which the files CANNOT be retrieved.

Sharing Mobile Data Through Tethering

If your computer can obtain an Internet connection via USB cable or *Bluetooth*, you can configure your phone to share its mobile data connection with your computer.

NOTE:

You cannot transfer files between your phone and your computer when the phone is USB tethered.

- Open Settings and touch Network & Internet > Hotspot & tethering.
- Touch USB tethering or Bluetooth tethering.
 - For USB tethering, connect your phone to the target device with the supplied USB cable before touching USB tethering.

 For Bluetooth tethering, pair your phone with the other device via Bluetooth and set the device to obtain data connection via Bluetooth.

NOTE:

To stop sharing your data connection, switch off **USB tethering** or **Bluetooth tethering**.

Sharing Files With Nearby Devices

With Nearby Share, you can share photos, videos, and documents with nearby devices via Bluetooth or Wi-Fi.

Turn Sharing On or Off

- On your phone, make sure Bluetooth, Wi-Fi and Location are turned on. See <u>Connecting to Bluetooth Devices</u>, <u>Connecting to Wi-Fi</u> and <u>Location</u>.
- Open the Settings app and touch Connected devices > Connection preferences > Nearby Share.
- 3. Touch the switch at the top to turn Nearby Share on or off.

Share Content With Someone

- 1. Open the content, like a photo or contact on your tablet.
- 2. Find and touch the Share option and then select Nearby Share.
- 3. Touch Turn on if Nearby Share is switched off.
- Hold your phone and your friend's device which supports the Nearby Share feature close to each other.

NOTE:

Make sure both devices are unlocked, and have Nearby Share, Wi-Fi, Bluetooth and location turned on.

- If prompted, touch the Nearby Share notification on your friend's device to make that device visible to nearby devices.
- On your phone, your friend's device name will appear and touch the device name to send the content.
- 7. Accept the sharing on your friend's device.

Get Content From Someone

- Ask your friend to follow the "<u>Share Content With Someone</u>" steps above.
- You'll get a notification that someone is sharing content with you. Touch the notification if you haven't set your phone visible to nearby devices.
 - NOTE:

Make sure both devices are unlocked, and have Nearby Share, Wi-Fi, Bluetooth and location turned on.

3. Touch Accept to get the content.

Choose Who Can Share Content With You

- Open the Settings app and touch Connected devices > Connection preferences > Nearby Share.
- 2. Touch **Device visibility** and choose one of the following options.
 - Everyone: Your phone is visible to anyone when they are

- nearby. Transfers won't start until you accept.
- Contacts: Your phone is visible to nearby contacts you choose while your phone screen is on and unlocked. You need to sign in to your Google account first.
- Hidden: Your phone is only visible while Nearby Share is turned on and you need to make your phone visible manually.

Set Data Usage for Sharing

- Open the Settings app and touch Connected devices > Connection preferences > Nearby Share.
- Touch Data / Wi-Fi only / Without Internet and choose one of them.
 - Data: Mobile data may be used for small files. Charges may apply.
 - ▶ Wi-Fi only: Never use mobile data to share.
 - ▶ Without Internet: Files will always be shared offline.

Phone Calls

You can place calls from the Phone app, the Contacts app, or other apps that display contact information. Wherever you see a phone number, you can usually touch it to dial.

Placing and Ending Voice Calls

Place a Voice Call by Dialing

- 1. From the home screen, touch 🕓 > 💷.
- 2. Enter the phone number or the contact name with the dialpad. Touch (X) to delete incorrect digits/letters.
 - NOTE:

As you enter the phone number or the contact name, your phone searches for matching information in your contacts. If you see the number and contact you want to call, touch it to get call, messaging, and history options.

3. Touch selow the keypad to dial the call.

NOTES:

- To make an international call, touch and hold the 0 key to enter the plus (+) symbol. Next, enter the country code followed by the city/area code and then the phone number.
- To redial the last call you made, open the dialpad, touch and touch (again.

End a Call

During a call, touch on the screen.

Answering or Rejecting Voice Calls

When you receive a voice call, the incoming call screen opens, displaying the Caller ID or the information about the caller that you've entered in the Contacts app. You can answer or reject the call, or reject it with a text message.

Answer a Voice Call

To answer an incoming call,

- If the phone screen is active, touch ANSWER.



To silence the ringer before answering the call, press the **Volume** key.

Reject a Voice Call

To reject an incoming voice call:

- If the phone screen is active, touch **DECLINE** to reject the call, or you can also touch the caller number or name and then touch **Reply** to reject the call and send a message to the caller.
- If the phone screen is locked, swipe down to reject the call, or touch Reply to reject the call and send a message to the caller.

NOTE:

To edit the preset text responses, open the **Phone** app and touch > **Settings** > **Quick responses**.

Working With the Call History

The call history is a list of all the calls you've placed, received, or missed. It provides a convenient way to redial a number, return a call, or add a number to your Contacts.

To open the call history, open the **Phone** app and touch **? > Call history**.

Place a Call From the Call History

- 1. Open the call history.
 - NOTE:

Touch Missed to find all missed calls.

Touch a number for more options about the call, or touch beside it to call back.

Save a Call History Number to a Contact

- 1. Open the call history.
- 2. Touch the number.
- To add the number to an existing contact, touch Add to a contact and search for the contact. To add a new contact, touch Create new contact.
- 4. Edit the contact information if necessary, and touch Save.

Take Other Actions on a Call History Entry

- 1. Open the call history.
- 2. Touch a number.
- 3. Touch an option.
 - Touch Send a message to send a message to the number.
 - Touch Block/report spam to block calls and messages from the number.
 - Touch Call details to view more call information. There you can touch Delete to delete the entry, Edit number before call to edit the number in the dialer before calling it, or Copy number to copy the phone number to the clipboard.

NOTE:

You can touch > Clear call history in the call history screen to delete all history records.

Calling Your Contacts

- 1. From the home screen, touch 🕓.
- Touch
 or
 at the bottom of the screen to find the contact you want to call. Your favorite contacts are displayed in the
 tab.
- Touch a contact in the tab, or touch a contact and then the number in the tab.

Checking Voicemail

If you have set the phone to divert calls to voicemail, callers can leave voicemail messages when they cannot reach you. Here's how to check the messages they left.

- 1. From the home screen, touch \bigcirc > \blacksquare .
- Touch and hold the 1 key in the dialer. If prompted, enter your voicemail password.
- Follow the voice prompts to listen to and manage your voicemail messages.

NOTE:

See <u>Set Voicemail</u> for how to set your voicemail service. For detailed information, please contact the service provider.

Using Options During a Call

During a call, you will see a number of on-screen options. Touch an option to select it.

NOTE:

Swipe left and right to find all options. Availability depends on your network.

- Touch \$\bigcup_{\color}^\cup \text{ to make another call separately from the first call, which is put on hold.
- Touch [[]] to put the call on hold.

- Touch to switch to the keypad when you need to enter a code (for example, the PIN for your voicemail or bank account) during the call.
- Touch \(\frac{1}{3} \) to mute or unmute your microphone.
- Touch speakerphone on or off.

WARNING!

Because of higher volume levels, do not place the phone near your ear during speakerphone use.

- Touch $\hat{\mathbf{1}}$ to merge the separate calls into a single conference call.
- Touch to end the current call.

Managing Multi-party Calls

When the call waiting and the conferences call feature are available, you can switch between two calls or set up a conference call.

NOTE:

Options and interface will vary. The conference call feature needs network support and may result in additional charges. Please contact your service provider for more information.

Switch Between Current Calls

When you're on a call, you can place/answer a second call without ending the first one.

To place the second call:

Once you have established the first call, touch \mathbb{Q}_{4}^{+} and dial the second number.

To answer the second call:

When you're on a call and another call comes in:

- Swipe up to answer the call. (This puts the first call on hold and answers the second call.)
- Touch Answer and end other call to answer the call. (This ends the first call and answers the second call.)
- Swipe down to reject the second call.
- Touch Reply to reject the second call and select a preset text message or write one to send to the caller.

To switch between two calls:

Touch 11.

Set Up a Conference Call

With this feature, you can talk to multiple people at the same time.

- Place the first call.
- Once you have established the connection, answer an incoming call or touch \$\frac{1}{2}\$ and dial the second number.
- 3. When you're connected to the second party, touch \hat{J} .
- If you need to add more parties, touch to dial the numbers, and touch to merge the calls one by one.

When a conference call is set up, you can touch **Manage** to see connected parties. Then you can end the call with a party by touching .

To end the conference call, touch .



NOTES:

- The number of calls you can merge depends on your network. Contact your mobile service provider for more information.
- If one of the people you called hangs up during your call, you and the remaining caller stay connected. If you initiated the call and are the first to hang up, all callers are disconnected.

Adjusting Your Call Settings

You can configure a number of settings for the Phone application.

NOTES:

- Some call options are usable only when these features are available, and may require network support and result in additional charges. Please contact your service provider for more information.
- "Caller ID and spam" and "Nearby places" are features offered by Google.

Set Contact Display Options

You can set the order of the contacts displayed in the 2 tab of the Phone app and the theme of the app.

- From the home screen, touch > Settings > Display options.
- Touch Sort by or Name format to set the order of the contacts and the format of the contact names.

- or -

Touch **Choose theme** to change the theme of the Phone app.

Set Sound and Vibration

Edit Quick Response to Rejected Callers

- From the home screen, touch > : > Settings > Quick responses.
- 2. Touch a text message to edit it.
- 3. Touch **OK** to save the message.

Use Fixed Dialing Numbers

Fixed Dialing Numbers (FDN) allows you to restrict outgoing calls to a limited set of phone numbers.

- From the home screen, touch > Settings > Calls > Fixed dialling numbers.
- 2. Select the following options you need:

- ► Enable FDN: Input the PIN2 code to enable the FDN feature.
- ▶ Change PIN2: Change the PIN2 code for FDN access.
- FDN list: Manage the FDN list.



The PIN2 code is provided by your service provider. Entering an incorrect PIN2 code more times than allowed can get your nano-SIM card locked. Contact your mobile service provider for assistance.

Forward Incoming Calls

The call forwarding feature allows you to forward your incoming calls to another phone number.

- From the home screen, touch > Settings > Calls > Call forwarding.
- 2. Touch an available option to enable or disable it.

Block Certain Types of Calls

If the call barring feature is available, you can use it to forbid certain types of calls. For example, you may forbid international roaming calls to avoid roaming charges.

- From the home screen, touch > Settings > Calls > Call barring.
- Select a call type to forbid or allow that type of calls. You can also deactivate all call barring settings or change the call barring password.

Use Call Waiting

Call Waiting can notify you of new incoming calls during a call.

- From the home screen, touch > Settings > Calls > Call waiting.
- 2. Touch Call waiting to enable or disable this feature.



Please contact your service provider to check whether the Call waiting feature is available.

Set Caller ID

Choose whether your number is displayed when someone receives your outgoing call.

- From the home screen, touch > Settings > Calls > Additional settings.
- 2. Touch Caller ID and select an option.

Block Certain Numbers

The call blocking feature allows you to forbid calls and messages from certain numbers.

- From the home screen, touch > > Settings > Blocked numbers.
- 2. Touch Add a number.
- 3. Enter a phone number or touch to select one from the contact list.

- 4. Touch Block.
- NOTES:
- You can also block calls from unidentified callers by switching on Unknown in the Blocked numbers screen.
- To unblock a number, touch
 \infty next to the number and touch
 Unblock.

Set Voicemail

- 1. From the home screen, touch \lor > \vdots > **Settings**.
- Touch Voicemail > Advanced Settings to select the voicemail service provider or view the voicemail number.

Set TTY Mode

Your phone is a TTY compatible device. A TTY device can allow people who have hearing or speech disabilities to communicate by telephone. Simply connect the TTY device to the phone's headset jack.

- From the home screen, touch > > Settings > Accessibility > TTY mode.
- Select one of the following options. Consult your teletypewriter manufacturer's manual if necessary.
 - TTY off: Users who can hear and talk can disable TTY support.
 - TTY full: Users who cannot talk or hear may use this mode to send and receive text messages through TTY device.
 - ▶ TTY HCO: Users who can hear, but cannot talk, may use this

- mode to listen to conversation of the other party, and respond via text messages.
- TTY VCO: Users who can talk, but cannot hear, may use this
 mode to talk through the phone and receive responses via
 text messages.

Set Hearing Aids

Your phone supports Hearing Aid Compatibility (HAC) function. When you turn on the hearing aid compatibility and use a hearing aid with a telecoil to answer the phone, it will help you hear more clearly during the phone call.

- From the home screen, touch > ; > Settings > Accessibility.
- 2. Touch **Hearing aids** to turn on/off hearing aid compatibility.

CAUTION:

Do not turn on the Hearing aids option unless you use a hearing aid with a telecoil. Using this setting without a hearing aid or with a hearing aid without a telecoil may be harmful to your hearing.

Enable "Flip to Silence"

When enabled, the feature allows you to mute incoming call ringtone by flipping the phone face down on a flat surface.

- From the home screen, touch > Settings > Flip to silence.
- 2. Touch **Flip to silence** to turn on or off the feature.

Contacts

You can add contacts on your phone and synchronize them with the contacts in your Google account or other accounts that support contact syncing.

To see your contacts, swipe up on the home screen and touch **Contacts**.

Checking Contact Details

- 1. Swipe up on the home screen and touch **Contacts**.
- 2. Scroll through the list to view all your contacts.
- 3. Touch a contact to view its details.

Adding a New Contact

- 1. Swipe up on the home screen and touch **Contacts**.
- 2. Touch + to add a new contact.
- Enter the contact name, phone numbers, and email addresses.
 Touch More fields to enter other information. If you have multiple account types associated with your phone, touch Save to and select an account. If a sync account is selected, the contacts can be synced automatically with the account online.
- 4. Touch Save to save the contact.

Importing and Exporting Contacts

You can import contacts from the nano-SIM card, the phone storage, or the microSDHC card, or export contacts to the phone storage or microSDHC card. This is especially useful when you need to transfer contacts between different devices.

Import Contacts From the nano-SIM Card

- 1. Swipe up on the home screen and touch **Contacts**.
- 2. Touch => Settings > Import > SIM card > OK.
- If you have multiple account types associated with your phone, touch the Save to field to select the account the contacts will be imported to.
- 4. Check the contacts you need and then touch Import.

Import Contacts From the microSDHC Card or Phone Storage

- 1. Swipe up on the home screen and touch Contacts.
- Touch = > Settings > Import > .vcf file.
- 3. If prompted, select the account the contacts will be imported to.
- 4. Navigate to the folder where the file is and touch the file.

Export Contacts to the microSDHC Card or Phone Storage

- 1. Swipe up on the home screen and touch Contacts.
- 2. Touch = > Settings > Export.
- The phone will prompt you with the name of the vCard file. You
 can change the default name or touch to change the
 directory that the file will be saved to.
- 4. Touch **SAVE** to create the file.

Sharing Contacts

- 1. Swipe up on the home screen and touch **Contacts**.
- Touch and hold one in the contact list and then touch the other ones you need.
- 3. Touch \triangleleft and choose how to share the contacts.

Working With Favorite Contacts

You can mark contacts as favorite to put them at the top of the contacts list.

Add a Contact to Favorites

- 1. Swipe up on the home screen and touch **Contacts**.
- 2. Touch a contact and then touch \Rightarrow at the top of the screen.

Remove a Contact From Favorites

- 1. Swipe up on the home screen and touch **Contacts**.
- Touch a favorite contact and then touch *



Managing Contacts With Labels

View Your Contact Labels

- 1. Swipe up on the home screen and touch Contacts.
- 2. Touch \equiv to view existing contact labels in the Labels section.
- Touch a label to view contacts with that label.



To send a message or an email to all contacts with the label, touch the label and touch : > Send message / Send email.

Set Up a New Label

- 1. Swipe up on the home screen and touch **Contacts**.
- Touch = > Create label.
- 3. Enter the label name and touch OK.
- 4. Touch **Add a contact** or 2+ and select the contact you wish to add the label to. To add multiple contacts, touch and hold one contact to select it. Then touch the others contacts and touch

Delete a Label

- 1. Swipe up on the home screen and touch Contacts.
- 2. Touch = and then touch a label.
- 3. Touch > Delete label.
- 4. Touch **OK**. The contacts themselves will not be deleted.

Edit a Label

- 1. Swipe up on the home screen and touch Contacts.
- 2. Touch = and then touch a label.
- Touch > Remove contacts or Rename label.
- Touch to remove the corresponding contact from the label, or edit the label name and touch OK.

Searching for a Contact

- 1. Swipe up on the home screen and touch Contacts.
- 2. Touch the search field at the top.
- Enter the contact name or other information (such as phone number) you want to search for. The contacts matched will be listed.

Editing Contacts

Edit Contact Details

- Swipe up on the home screen and touch Contacts.
- Touch a contact and then touch Edit contact.
- 3. Edit the contact and touch Save.

Set a Ringtone for a Contact

Assign a special ringtone to a contact, so you know who is calling when you hear the ringtone.

- 1. Swipe up on the home screen and touch Contacts.
- Touch a contact you want to set a ringtone for, and then touch
 > Set ringtone.
- Select a ringtone you like and touch OK or touch Add ringtone at the bottom to choose an audio file and set it as the ringtone.

Delete Contacts

- 1. Swipe up on the home screen and touch **Contacts**.
- 2. Touch and hold the contact you want to remove.
- Touch more contacts you want to delete, and then touch > Delete > Delete.

Setting Call Blocking

The call blocking feature allows you to block calls and messages from certain numbers.

- 1. Open Contacts.
- Touch = > Settings > Blocked numbers.
- 3. Touch Add a number.
- Enter a phone number or touch to select a number from the contact list.
- 5. Touch Block.
- NOTES:
- You can also block calls from unidentified callers by switching on Unknown in the Blocked numbers screen.
- To unblock a number, touch X next to the number and touch Unblock.

Web Accounts

Adding or Removing Accounts

You can add multiple Google accounts, Microsoft Exchange ActiveSync® accounts, and other kinds of accounts, depending on the apps installed on your phone.

Add an Account

- 1. Open Settings and touch Accounts > Add account.
- 2. Touch the type of account you want to add.
- Follow the on-screen steps to enter the information about the account. Most accounts require a username and password, but the details may vary. You may also need to obtain some information from IT support or your system administrator.

When the account is successfully added, it is displayed in the Accounts menu in Settings.

Remove an Account

Removing an account will delete it and all information associated with it, such as emails and contacts, from your phone.

- Open Settings and touch Accounts.
- 2. Touch the account you'd like to remove.
- 3. Touch REMOVE ACCOUNT > REMOVE ACCOUNT.

Configuring Account Sync

Configure Auto Sync Setting

- 1. Open Settings and touch Accounts.
- Touch Automatically sync app data to enable or disable automatic sync.
- Touch OK.
 - When automatic sync is turned on, changes you make to information on your phone or on the web are automatically synced with each other.
 - When automatic sync is turned off, you need to sync manually to collect emails, updates, or other recent information.

Sync Manually

- 1. Open Settings and touch Accounts.
- 2. Touch the account you want to sync.
- 3. Touch Account sync > > Sync now.

Change an Account's Sync Settings

- Open Settings and touch Accounts.
- 2. Touch the account.
- Touch Account sync. The Account sync screen appears, showing a list of information the account can sync.

4. When auto sync data is enabled, switch items on or off as you need. The enabled types of information will be kept in sync automatically between the phone and the web. When auto sync data is disabled, touch a listing to sync that type of information between the phone and the web.

Messages

You can use Messages to exchange text messages (SMS), multimedia messages (MMS), and chat messages.

Opening the Messages Screen

Touch on the home screen.

The Messages screen opens, where you can create a new message or open an existing conversation.

- Touch **Start chat** to write a new text or multimedia message.
- Touch an existing conversation to open the exchanged messages.

Sending a Message

- On the Messages screen, touch Start chat.
- 2. Add recipients in one of the following ways.
 - Manually enter the recipient's number or the contact name. (You can touch iii to enter numbers with a dialpad.) If the phone presents a few suggestions, touch the one you want to add.
 - Touch a contact listed below the To field.
 - To add more recipients for an MMS group conversation, touch 2 to add more recipients and then touch Next. Then edit the group name and touch **Next**.
- 3. Touch the Text field and enter the message text. Touch (2) to add emoji to your text message.

- If you want to send a multimedia message, touch to add pictures, videos, or contacts, or touch and hold to record an audio clip.
- For a multimedia message, touch and hold to mark the message as urgent or add a message subject.
- 6. Touch .
- NOTES:
- You can also include email addresses as recipients for multimedia messages.
- Do not add any attachment if you want to send a text message.
 Otherwise, you may be charged for a multimedia message.

Replying to a Message

Messages you receive are appended to existing conversations of the same number. If the new message comes from a new number, a new conversation is created.

- On the Messages screen, touch the conversation that has the message you want to reply to.
- Type your reply in the text field at the bottom. You can touch
 to add emoji,
 to add picture/video/contact, or

 to record an audio clip.
- 3. Touch .

Forwarding a Message

- On the Messages screen, touch the conversation that has the message(s) you want to forward.
- Touch and hold one message you want to forward, and then touch > Forward.
- Touch the conversation you'd like to forward the message(s) to, or touch New message to enter new recipient(s).
- Edit the message if necessary and touch >.

Message Options

On the Messages screen, touch and hold a thread and the following options are available.

- Touch to archive the thread. You can touch > Archived from the Messages screen to find all archived messages.
- Touch > Delete to delete the thread.
- Touch > Add contact to add the new number in the thread to your contacts.
- Touch > Block > OK to block the contact or number in the thread, and the thread will be moved to "Spam and blocked." You can touch > Spam and blocked from the Messages screen to find all blocked messages.

NOTE:

You can touch and hold a thread and touch more to select them, and then choose to archive or delete them.

Web Browser

Use Chrome to view web pages and search for information.

Opening the Browser

Touch on the home screen to launch the web browser. The browser also opens when you touch a web link—for example, in an email or a text message.

- 1. Open the Chrome app.
- 2. Touch the address box at the top.
- Enter the address (URL) of a web page, or enter terms you want to search for
- 4. Touch a URL or search suggestion or touch the enter key on the keyboard to open the web page or search results.

Using Multiple Browser Tabs

You can open several web pages at the same time (one page in each tab) and switch between them freely.

Open a New Browser Tab

Touch > New tab / New Incognito tab. A new browser window opens

Switch Between Browser Tabs

- Touch the (2) icon. The number in the icon indicates the number of currently active browser windows. Opened web pages will be listed. Swipe up and down to see them all.
- 2. Touch a listing to switch to that tab.
- NOTE:

Swipe a listing horizontally or touch X to close the tab.

Downloading Files

- Touch and hold an image or a link to a file or to another web page.
- 2. In the menu that opens, touch **Download image** or **Download link**

The downloaded files are saved to your phone or the microSDHC card. You can view or open them by touching : > **Downloads** in Chrome.

Camera

Capturing a Photo

- 1. Touch on the home screen.
- Aim the camera at the subject and make any necessary adjustment. Photo (auto camera) mode is used by default.
 - NOTE:

You can pinch or spread your fingers on the screen to zoom in or zoom out before taking a picture.

Using Portrait Mode

You can use portrait mode to take a picture with the person's face in focus and the background blurred.

- From the home screen, touch > Portrait.
- Aim the camera at the subject and touch the face you want to focus.
- 3. Touch (a) to take the photo.

Recording a Video

- 1. From the home screen, touch > Video.
- Aim the camera at the subject and make any necessary adjustments.
- 3. Touch to start recording.
- 4. Touch oto stop recording.

NOTES:

- You can pinch or spread on the screen to zoom in or zoom out before and during recording.
- You can touch the screen and drag to adjust the exposure before and during recording.

Translating Text

You can use the camera to capture text for translation.

- From the home screen, touch > Translate.
- 2. Aim the camera at the word you want to translate.
- Touch . Google Lens will try to recognize the words and show the translation. You can touch . Change translation language to choose the target language.

Customizing Camera and Video Settings

Before capturing a photo or video, you can touch ((a) to open the following options.

NOTE:

Some camera and video options will change in different camera modes.

- Flash: Adjust the flash setting.
- Face enhance: Turn on or off face enhancement.
- Timer: Set a time delay before the camera takes a picture automatically after you touch the shutter icon.
- Storage: Change the storage for captured photos and videos when a microSDXC card is installed.

Voice Recorder

Voice Recorder enables you to record and listen to voice memos.

Recording a Voice Memo

- 1. Swipe up on the home screen and touch Voice Recorder.
- 2. Touch $\frac{1}{2}$ to select the audio format of the recording.
- Touch to start recording. During recording, you can do the following:
 - ► Touch or to pause or continue the recording.
 - Touch or to add an empty tag or photo tag to the recording.
- 4. Touch **DONE** to stop recording.
- Edit the file name and touch SAVE to save the recording.If you don't want to save the memo after recording it, touch DELETE > DELETE to delete it.

Playing a Voice Memo

- Touch = at the top right of the screen to see all recordings.
- Touch the title of a memo to play it. During the playing, you can touch to o to add an empty tag or photo tag.

NOTE:

Touch **View tag** to check all time tags. You can touch "+" after an empty tag to add an image or text, touch an image to delete it or replace it with another image, or touch and hold a tag to delete it.

Trimming a Voice Memo

- 1. While playing a recording, touch X to open the editing screen.
- Drag or to trim the recording. You can touch to preview the trimmed recording.
- 3. Touch TRIM.
- 4. Edit the new file name and touch SAVE.

More Apps

Calculator

Swipe up on the home screen and touch **Calculator** to use the builtin calculator for some basic as well as advanced mathematical equations.

Video

Swipe up on the home screen and touch **Video** to find and play videos on your phone and microSDHC card.

Google Apps



Google services may not be available in certain region.

- Assistant: Get help with your calendar, commute, and more when and where you need it from the Al-powered Google Assistant.
- Calendar: Keep track of life's important events with Google Calendar synced across your devices.
- Chrome: Use the Chrome app to browse the Internet and get your bookmarks, browsing history, and more synced with your Google account.
- Clock: Check local time in places around the world, set alarms, use timers, and set a bedtime schedule to get a good sleep.

- Drive: Store files on Google servers for free after you sign in to your Google account. You can access them on your computers, your phones and other devices, share them, or collaborate with others.
- Duo: Video chat one-on-one using Wi-Fi or mobile data.
- Files: The file management app that helps you free up space
 with cleaning recommendations, find files faster with search and
 simple browsing, share files offline with others, and back up files
 to the cloud to save you space on device.
- Gallery: Organize, browse, share, delete, and edit your photos and videos.

Settings

Touch **Settings** on the home screen. Settings contains most of the tools for customizing and configuring your phone. In some menus, you may need to touch **Advanced** to see all the options.

Network & Internet

Wi-Fi

Turn Wi-Fi on or off and configure your Wi-Fi connections (see *Connecting to Wi-Fi*).

Mobile Network

Control mobile data use, manage data use and limit, select network operators, and check access point names (see <u>Connecting to Mobile</u> <u>Networks</u>).



The data usage is measured by your phone, and your carrier's data usage accounting may differ.

Airplane Mode

Turn airplane mode on or off. All the phone's radios that transmit voice or data are turned off when airplane mode is on.

Hotspot & Tethering

Share your phone's mobile data connection with PCs or other devices. See *Sharing Mobile Data Through Tethering*.

Data Saver

Data Saver prevents apps from using data connection in the background. For an app you're currently using, it can access data, but may do so less frequently when Data Saver is enabled. You can also touch **Unrestricted data** and allow some apps to always have access to data connection even when Data Saver is turned on.

VPN

Set up and connect to virtual private networks. Virtual private networks (VPNs) allow you to connect to the resources inside a secured local network. VPNs are commonly deployed by corporations, schools, and other institutions to let people access local network resources when not on campus, or when connected to a wireless network. Depending on the type of VPN you are using, you may be required to enter your login credentials or install security certificates before you can connect to your VPN. You can get this information from your network administrator.



You need to set a lock screen pattern, PIN, or password before you can use a VPN.

Private DNS

To get information from a website, your tablet first asks where the website is. Private DNS is a way to help secure these questions and answers. We recommend keeping Private DNS turned on.

Open Settings and touch Network & Internet > Advanced > Private DNS to change Private DNS settings.

Connected Devices

Touch **Connection preferences > Bluetooth**. You can turn *Bluetooth* on or off and configure your *Bluetooth* connections. See <u>Connecting</u> to <u>Bluetooth Devices</u>.

Other features you can use in the Connection preferences menu include:

- Printing: Use the default printing service or other printer plugins installed from the Google Play Store or your printer manufacturer for wireless printing.
- Files received via Bluetooth: Check files received via Bluetooth.
- Nearby Share: Use Bluetooth or Wi-Fi to share files with other devices near your phone. You can share things like photos, videos, documents, and links. See Sharing Files With Nearby Devices.

Apps & Notifications

App Info

Touch an app to see its information and configure the available options. Touch **SEE ALL [number] APPS** to see all installed apps.

Conversations

Touch **Conversations** to check your priority and modified conversations in the Messages app and change conversation settings. Once you mark a conversation as priority by touching and holding it on the notification panel, or make any other changes to a conversation, it will appear in this menu.

Notifications

Touch **Notifications** to manage app notifications.

Screen Time

Touch Screen time to find out how much time you spend on the phone and set daily time limits for most apps. When you reach the time limits, apps are closed and their icons dim for the rest of the day so that you can disconnect.

Default Apps

Touch **Advanced** > **Default apps** to select the default app for web browsing, digital assistant, home, messaging, etc. Touch Opening links to set Instant apps options, or touch an installed app to check its supported links and set whether to open the links in the app and clear the app's defaults.

Permission Manager

Touch **Advanced** > **Permission manager** to check what apps have been allowed to access certain permissions. You can also change the app permissions.



WARNING!

Changing the app permissions may result in the app not working correctly or as originally intended.

Special App Access

Touch Advanced > Special app access to set special access and authorizations of apps.

Battery

View the battery level, check what has been using the battery, enable Battery Saver or Battery Manager, or manually optimize apps to improve battery life.

Features

The following features are available.

- System navigation: Change the navigation bar style for the phone. You can learn how to use each navigation style in the HELP section.
- Scheduled power On/Off: Set the day and time when the phone automatically powers on or off. Touch the switches on the right to turn the features on or off.

Display

Configure the display options, including brightness level, Dark theme, Night Light mode, wallpaper, screen timeout, screen rotation, font size, and more.

Sound

Adjust different types of volume (see <u>Adjusting Volumes</u>), set notification mode (see <u>Switching to Silent or Vibration Mode</u>), set Do not disturb options (see <u>Using Do Not Disturb Mode</u>), set up ringtones, alarm and notification sounds (see <u>Changing the Ringtone</u>, <u>Notification Sound</u>, <u>and Alarm Sound</u>), or select system sounds (see <u>Turning System Sounds On/Off</u>).

Storage

The Storage settings menu lets you check memory information for your microSDHC card and phone storage.

You can choose the default location for new data, such as recorded voice memos. Touch **Saving location** and select to store items in the phone storage or the installed microSDHC card.

Under DEVICE STORAGE, touch **Internal shared storage** to get a detailed breakdown of space usage by type. Touch **MANAGE STORAGE** to delete the files you do not need.

Under PORTABLE STORAGE, safely mount, unmount (remove), and format your microSDHC card. For more information about using the device storage and the microSDHC card, see <u>Using the microSDHC Card as Portable or Device Storage</u>.

Privacy

Manage app permissions (see <u>Permission Manager</u>), lock screen notifications, password display, and information shared with Google (such as autofill data, location history, ad ID, and activities.)

Location

Manage location services to help your phone and apps determine your location. To use location-related applications, such as finding your location on Google Maps, you must have location services turned on.

You can also check the apps that recently requested your location data, manage location permission for each app, turn on/off Wi-Fi and Bluetooth scanning, and control other location-related services.

Security

The Security menu allows you to configure the following options.

- Google Play Protect: Check your apps and device for harmful behavior.
- Security update: Check and download system updates.
- Find My Device: Link your phone to your Google account so you
 can locate the device remotely and keep your data safe when the
 phone is lost.
- Screen lock: Set up a screen lock after which you must swipe on the phone, draw a pattern, or enter a PIN/password to access the phone (see <u>Protecting Your Phone With Screen Locks</u>).

Touch is beside **Screen lock** to set the following options.

- Make pattern visible: Show the pattern as you draw it. This option is available when unlock pattern is set.
- Lock after screen timeout: Set the time needed for the lock protection to be activated after the screen turns off. This

option is available when unlock pattern, PIN or password is set.

- Power button instantly locks: Lock protection is activated immediately when you press the Power key. This option is available when unlock pattern, PIN or password is set.
- Smart Lock: Keep the phone unlocked when connected to trusted devices, in trusted places, or while being held or carried.

NOTE:

You need to sign in to your Google account on the phone to use all the Smart Lock features.

- Device admin apps: Activate or deactivate apps to be device administrators
- SIM card lock:
 - Lock SIM card: Activate or deactivate the PIN lock to require PIN before accessing the nano-SIM card.
 - Change SIM PIN: Change the PIN used to access the nano-SIM card.

NOTE:

Put all your confidential passwords in a safe place for future use. If you enter the wrong SIM PIN more times than allowed, your nano-SIM card will be locked and you cannot access the mobile network. Contact your operator for a PIN Unlock Key (PUK) to restore the nano-SIM card.

 Encryption & credentials: Check the encryption status of your phone and set the credential storage options.

- Trust agents: Activate or deactivate trust agents.
- App pinning: Pin an app's screen to keep it in view until you unpin it. This feature can be used, for example, to let a trusted friend play a specific game (see <u>Protecting Your Phone With App Pinning</u>).

Accounts

The **Accounts** menu lists the accounts you have signed in on the phone for you to manage them. You can also touch **Add account** to sign in to or create other accounts or turn on/off auto sync.

Accessibility

The **Accessibility** menu allows you to configure the system accessibility options and accessibility plug-ins on your phone, such as using **Color inversion** or **Font size** for users with sight problems.

Digital Wellbeing & Parental Controls

Open **Settings** and touch the **Digital Wellbeing & parental controls** menu to improve your digital wellbeing and balance your child's screen time.

- Touch Show your data to get information on how you spend time on your phone and apps.
 - Dashboard: Check the screen time, numbers of notifications, and opened times of each app. You can set daily timers for the most-used apps to prevent overindulgence. See <u>Screen</u> <u>Time</u>.

- Focus mode: Select distracting apps and turn on focus mode to pause these apps when you need time to focus.
- REDUCE INTERRUPTIONS: Manage app notifications and Do Not Disturb settings to reduce interruptions from your important tasks.
- ► Show icon in the app list: Display or hide the Digital Wellbeing app in the app list.
- Touch Set up parental controls to add content restrictions and set other limits for your child with the Family Link app.

Google

The **Google** menu lets you manage settings for Google apps and services that are installed on your device.

DuraSpeed

DuraSpeed helps boost foreground apps by restricting apps running in the background. You can turn on or off this feature and set apps that are allowed to run in the background.

System

Languages and Input

Configure options related to system language, input methods and assistance, speech input and output as well as mouse/trackpad input.

Date and Time

Set date, time, time zone, and how time is displayed. You can also use network-provided data (see <u>Setting the Date and Time</u>).

Downloads

Check files you have downloaded.

Touch a file to open it; touch and hold for multi-selection for sharing and deletion.

Backup

Manage data backup options. To easily restore or switch devices at any time, you can enable automatic backup to Google Drive of important data. You need to sign in to your Google account to use this feature.

Reset Options

Reset network settings, app preferences, or the phone to factory default status.

System Update

Check for, download and install system updates.

About Phone

View phone number, nano-SIM card status, legal information, and other information. You can also touch **Emergency information** to edit your medical information and emergency contacts for first responders to read from your lock screen.

Troubleshooting

If you encounter problems while using the phone, or if it performs abnormally, you can refer to the chart below. If your particular problem cannot be resolved using the information in the chart, contact the dealer where you purchased the phone.

Radio Frequency (RF) Energy

This phone is designed and manufactured not to exceed the emission limits for exposure to radio frequency (RF) energy set by the Federal Communications Commission of the United States and Industry Canada of Canada.

During SAR testing, this device was set to transmit at its highest certified power level in all tested frequency bands, and placed in positions that simulate RF exposure in usage against the head with no separation, and near the body with the separation of 10 mm. Although the SAR is determined at the highest certified power level,

the actual SAR level of the device while operating can be well below the maximum value. This is because the phone is designed to operate at multiple power levels so as to use only the power required to reach the network. In general, the closer you are to a wireless base station antenna, the lower the power output.

The exposure standard for wireless devices employing a unit of measurement is known as the Specific Absorption Rate, or SAR. The SAR limit set by the FCC is 1.6 W/kg and 1.6 W/kg by Industry Canada.

Driving

Seizures/Blackouts

The phone can produce a bright or flashing light. A small percentage of people may be susceptible to blackouts or seizures (even if they have never had one before) when exposed to flashing lights or light patterns such as when playing games or watching video. If you have experienced seizures or blackouts or have a family history of such occurrences, please consult a physician. To reduce the risk of blackouts or seizures, use your phone in a well-lit room and take frequent breaks.

Repetitive Strain Injuries

To minimize the risk of Repetitive Strain Injury (RSI) when texting or playing games with your phone:

Do not grip the phone too tightly.

- · Press the buttons lightly.
- Use the special features which are designed to minimize the times of pressing buttons, such as Message Templates and Predictive Text.
- Take frequent breaks to stretch and relax.

Emergency Calls

This phone, like any other wireless phone, operates using radio signals, which cannot guarantee connection in all conditions. Therefore, you must never rely solely on any wireless phone for emergency communications.

Loud Noise

This phone is capable of producing loud noises, which may damage your hearing. Turn down the volume before using headphones, *Bluetooth* headsets or other audio devices.

Phone Heating

Your phone may become warm during charging and during normal use.

Electrical Safety

Accessories

Use only approved accessories. Do not connect with incompatible products or accessories. Take care not to touch or allow metal objects, such as coins or key rings, to contact or short-circuit the

charging port. Never puncture the surface of the phone with sharp objects.

Connection to Vehicles

Seek professional advice when connecting a phone interface to the vehicle electrical system.

Faulty and Damaged Products

Do not attempt to disassemble the phone or its accessories. Only qualified personnel can service or repair the phone or its accessories. If your phone (or its accessories) has been submerged in water, punctured, or subjected to a severe fall, do not use it until you have taken it to be checked at an authorized service center.

Radio Frequency Interference

General Statement on Interference

Care must be taken when using your phone in close proximity to personal medical devices, such as pacemakers and hearing aids. Please consult your doctor and the device manufacturers to determine if the operation of your phone may interfere with the operation of your medical devices.

Pacemakers

Pacemaker manufacturers recommend that a minimum separation of 6 inches (15 cm) be maintained between a mobile phone and a pacemaker to avoid potential interference with the pacemaker. To

achieve this, use the phone on the opposite ear to your pacemaker and do not carry it in a breast pocket.

Hearing Aids

People with hearing aids or other cochlear implants may experience interfering noises when using wireless devices or when one is nearby. The level of interference will depend on the type of hearing device and the distance from the interference source. Increasing the separation between them may reduce the interference. You may also consult your hearing aid manufacturer to discuss alternatives.

Medical Equipment

Turn off your wireless device when you are requested to do so in hospitals, clinics or healthcare facilities. These requests are designed to prevent possible interference with sensitive medical equipment.

Aircraft

Turn off your wireless device whenever you are instructed to do so by airport or airline staff. Consult the airline staff about the use of wireless devices onboard the aircraft and enable airplane mode of your phone when boarding an aircraft.

Interference in Vehicles

Please note that because of possible interference with electronic equipment, some vehicle manufacturers forbid the use of mobile phones in their vehicles unless a hands-free kit with an external antenna is included in the installation.

Explosive Environments

Gas Stations and Explosive Atmospheres

In locations with potentially explosive atmospheres, obey all posted signs to turn off wireless devices such as your phone or other radio equipment. Areas with potentially explosive atmospheres include fueling areas, below decks on boats, fuel or chemical transfer or storage facilities, and areas where the air contains chemicals or particles, such as grain, dust, or metal powders.

Blasting Caps and Areas

Power off your mobile phone or wireless device when in a blasting area or in areas where signs are posted to power off "two-way radios" or "electronic devices" to avoid interfering with blasting operations.
